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Dear Mr. Pandurevic:

evaluated Mr. Jon Suech in my office in reference to severe residuals of injury sustained to his right hand on September 29, 1993. At that time, about 3 o'clock in the ifternoon, being employed as a machine operator for the World Stamping Company xhen he sustained a rather significant severe crushing injury to his right upper extremity which injured quite a few major structures. He essentially had **a** devascularized right upper extremity and was conveyed on an emergency basis to the MetroHealth Medical Center. He came under the care of the Hand Surgery Department and taken to surgery which ended up being 9-1/2 hours of surgery. This vas from a crush trauma which ruined the blood supply, as well as the transect of the nedian, radial and ulnar nerves in the forearm. It also destroyed the proximal row of parpals, fractured his radius, and created substantial skin loss. 'He was hospital for approximately 28 days. He has had three surgeries since that time.

As expected, he underwent extensive hand therapy but he still has essentially **a** unctionless stiff right hand. There is some motion left in his fingers, but there is very

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he will be never be able to return to **a** machine operator status unless it is solely a onehand type of employment. I strongly would recommend Vocational Retraining
